## **Research Experience**

#### Honors Thesis | Arizona State University | 2013-2015

I worked with Neurologist Dr. Matthew Hoerth and neuropsychologist Dr. Dona Locke at the Mayo Clinic in Scottsdale, Arizona. We studied whether gender affects optimal cut scores on the Personality Assessment Inventory (PAI) for diagnosing epileptic vs. nonepileptic seizures. Under supervision of Dr. Richard Lanyon at Arizona State University, I determined that male and female performance differ on the PAI in the categories that are predictors for nonepileptic seizures. I analyzed demographic data and ran ROC curve analyses for sensitivity and specificities of T scores. I calculated respective hit rates, likelihood ratios, positive predictive value, and negative predictive values for males and females. I determined optimal cut scores using these values. This paper is currently under review to be submitted to Epilepsy & Beahavior.

#### Research Assistant | Arizona State University | 2011-2012

➤ I assisted Dr. Art Glenberg and his embodied cognition research lab with various research projects. As a research assistant, I collected data from the undergraduate student population by administering tests, as well as attended weekly meetings in which I helped develop ideas for new projects. I assisted in developing a project regarding how joint body schemas and action and perception play a role in the cognitive development of language comprehension. I became acquainted with embodied cognition literature and current research.

➤ I assist Dr. Kacy Welsh-Morris in teaching her developmental psychology course to undergraduate students at University of Georgia. ➤ I executed medical documentation for emergency physicians by charting patient information from their initial complaint to disposition. I documented patient symptoms, medical examinations, procedures, and diagnoses. I learned medical terminology and professionalism within the medical field. I wrote a History of Present illness for each patient encounter, and therefore gained objective writing skills particularly in relation to clinical experiences.
